From Library JournalIntended for collectors, this book surveys the utilitarian stoneware that was produced by American potteries from 1630 to the early 20th century. It is a companion volume to Ketchum's American Redware (Holt, 1991), which it resembles in coverage and format. The author has made a good synthesis of many regional studies of folk pottery. After an informative introductory section describing types of stoneware products, he

summarizes the stoneware production of states and regions in a well-balanced but somewhat cursory treatment of individual potters. The illustrations are all excellent color photographs showing good examples of the stoneware potters' craft.
