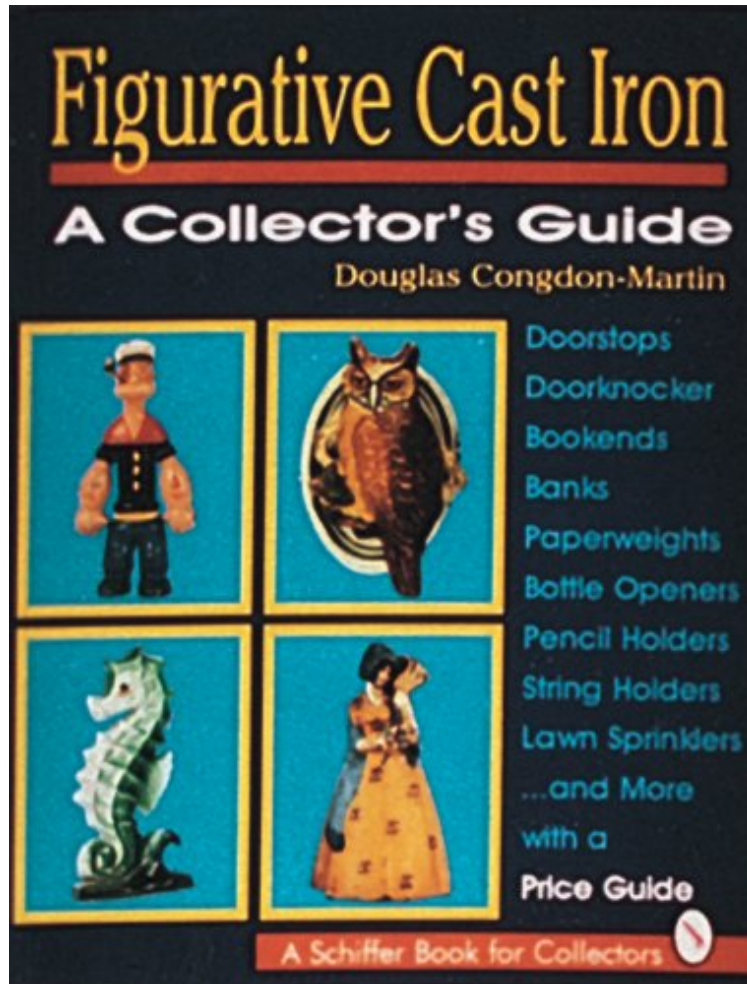

been fine since. The book itself has a variety of doorstops, bookends, bottle openers, still banks, string holders and tiny paper weights. Some of the items are different than "the doorstop book" and some are a repeat. This book has a weird "find the value" code in the back of the book that was a total pain flipping back and forth (they should have made the binding better just for people having to flip constantly back and forth so much to match up each picture with the code in the back of the book). Anyhow, I spent 2 whole evenings just looking up the values in the back of the book and writing them on the photos themselves so for future reference it will be much much easier for me and I will not have to take as many aspirins!
